President's Report:

Report prepared and read by Richard Dalziel (copy of report attached to these minutes).

Treasurer's Report:

Copy of financial statements provided to members.

Membership numbers steady for the year.

- Grants received from Motorsport Australia applied to purchase of shade sails for use at club events.
- Advertising revenue was \$300 (thanks to our advertisers).
- Social function costs for end of year lunch at Panorama House.
- AP costs maintenance of grounds in preparation for events/hirings.
- Costs of annual concorso were high due to an alternative venue used for 2023 (original venue unsuitable due to heavy rains at the time).
- Membership year moved from calendar year to financial year (i.e. July to June).
- Net surplus \$2,937.97. (Copy of financials attached to these minutes).

General Business:

- Membership dues and benefits were discussed during the meeting at the request of a member.
- Warren Smith noted that the club subsidises numerous events over the year so that benefits are provided to those members who participate in Club activities.
- Questions were asked about the reduction of Public Liability costs of the past years, Public Officer and other members highlighted the fact that the Public Liability for all events, both social and motor sport are now covered under our affiliation to Motorsport Australia (formerly CAMS).
- Discussion continued highlighting costs of Council of Motor Clubs affiliation fees; the fee is based on number of Club members.
- Suggestion from the floor that members holding Historical registration should pay a premium on membership fees.
- The new committee will participate in a review of Fiat Club and Ansell Park administration and governance.
- Member Tony Studans discussed the Ansell Park property, and its use.

A PRESIDENTIAL SUMMARY FOR 2022

(Presented at the 2023 FIAT Club of NSW AGM)

How time flies, and memories fade, this time last year we were still dealing with Covid restrictions in many settings (facemasks, social distancing, QR entry codes), as well as flooding at Ansell Park which caused us to abandon the AGM at this venue.

I think we all hoped 2022 would be the "recovery year we needed to have", and while it was for our social functions, our motorkhana programs were decimated again when the grounds flooded for potentially the fourth time. Take a second to look up and imagine 6m of water over this field. Better luck this year as they say.

Events co-coordinator Giovanni managed to keep us motivated to get out and use our cars by arranging regular coffee breakfasts, lunches, gelato gatherings, plus burger and pizza nights. These activities were held in different areas in, out and across the Sydney basin to cater for the diverse residential spread of our membership. Hopefully there was an event near you, and you could attend.

Apart from food related activities, we were finally able to attend some displays this year, including Auto-Italia, CMC – Shannons Sydney Classic (to showcase the 127 and X1/9), Norton St AutoFesta, and the annual Concorso (although limited in size at the last minute due to poor ground conditions).

The X1/9s participated in an anniversary weekend run to Eden, a couple of members attended the Fiat 123 Anniversary event in Bendigo (which was organised by the Victorian club), and a couple of members participated in the Lap of the Lake (Macquarie) event organised by CIAO.

Motorsport activities did happen thankfully, with some hill climb events (Huntley & Mt Panorama), some bitumen motorkhana events (Nirimba, Ringwood Park, SMP Skidpan) with several junior family members participating which was great to see. The club also fielded a team at Winton for the AROCA 6 hour (or did that become 12 hour), so there was still some friendly competition with the "Vics", given the Nationals were not held in 2022, fingers crossed for 2023. A club group also participated (in terrible conditions) at sadly one of the last events (for now) at Wake-field.

Editor Lorenzo provided a great magazine each month, with regular and interesting commentary including the latest on the electric Fiats, as well as picking up the secretary's role.

Membership Secretary Cheryl presided over the change of membership year from calendar to financial, which gave us all 6 months bonus membership. Membership levels remain good with a total of 329 members (211 full, 17 life, 59 joint / family, 42 junior).

The Website / Facebook admins Mark, Adrian & Marty, monitored content and improved the electronic distribution of the Fiat Focus magazine. Mark also introduced online ticketing as a trial for the Concorso event. Facebook followers were up around the 1500 level last time I checked.

Vice President Murray managed the monthly Zoom committee meeting hook ups, and also attended and organised some of the mid-week OASIS runs which we promote for those who can attend.

Treasurer Susan has maintained the accounts for another year and ensured our bills were paid on time.

Committee Person Adrian has picked up a number of tasks this year, and we thank him for his efforts.

The AP sub-committee headed by Michael continued to monitor the impacts of the flooding in the Richmond area with regular inspections, and rectified any issues, so the site remained secure and clear of debris, including removal of animal carcasses. The grounds have recovered as you can see here today.

Historic registrations have remained steady with around 133 members (over 60% of full members participate) with 198 cars on HVS, which is a significant administrative task for the club, with those members receiving excellent value from their membership, in the form of discounted registration and CTP costs.

Finally, I would like to thank our advertisers & sponsors, all the committee and members for their continued support of the club.

VFACTS: Australia's new car sales results for 2022 | CarExpert

New vehicle sales grew 3.0 per cent in 2022 despite widely publicised supply issues, finishing up at around 1.08 million units for the calendar year.

Annual sales data (VFACTS) shows that 1,081,429 new cars, SUVs and commercial vehicles were delivered in 2022, making it the best result since 2018 when 1,153,111 vehicles were sold.

Toyota was dominant. The Japanese carmaker sold a total of 231,050 cars, SUVs and commercial vehicles locally during 2022, lifting sales by 3.3 per cent. One in five new vehicles delivered last year was a Toyota.

The brand achieved a new record for hybrid vehicles too, selling a total of 72,815 petrol-electric models. This is 31.5 per cent of all Toyota vehicles delivered in 2022, and thus if Toyota Hybrid was a separate franchise, it would rank sixth in the market.

Second place finisher was Mazda despite a 5.3 per cent drop in deliveries, ahead of an impressive Kia in third spot (up 15.3 per cent).

The Korean brand edged out Mitsubishi which itself had nearly 14 per cent annual growth, and banished its sibling brand Hyundai into fifth spot.

Smaller-volume brands that spiked in percentage terms included Ram (up 52.8 per cent), GWM/Haval (up 36.2 per cent and finishing 13th overall), SsangYong (up 32.4 per cent), Porsche (up 26.6 per cent), Renault (up 24.7 per cent), Suzuki (up 23.5 per cent), Chevrolet (up 23.4 per cent), and Volvo (up 18.7 per cent).

Fiat's new electric small SUV taking shape

Fiat's next SUV will offer electric power and a more modern interior, but its styling closely resembles the moribund 500X.

The Fiat 500X is set to be replaced by a new SUV that will offer the option of an electric powertrain, and it's been spied testing in Europe.

The exterior styling appears to be an evolution over the outgoing 500X, with a similar shape and 500-inspired design elements retained like the big round headlights and rectangular tail lights.

However, the interior is quite a bit different from the outgoing SUV. There's a large, circular instrument cluster - shades of Mini along with a rectangular, tablet-style touchscreen sitting atop the centre stack.

The new crossover is expected to share its platform with the recently revealed Jeep Avenger, as well as other Stellantis models like the Citroen C4 and Peugeot 2008.

It's set to enter production at Stellantis' plant in Tychy, Poland alongside the Avenger and an upcoming entry-level Alfa Romeo crossover.

Judging by the advanced state of this prototype, a reveal could take place this year.

It's unclear just how large the Fiat SUV could be. The Jeep Avenger measures just 4.08m long, while a Peugeot 2008 is 4.3m long. The outgoing 500X is somewhere in the middle at 4.24m long.

While all vehicles on the Common Modular

Platform are front-wheel drive, Jeep has previewed an all-wheel drive version of its Avenger.

If the Fiat follows its Jeep sibling, it will use a 115kW/260Nm electric motor and a 54kWh nickel manganese cobalt lithium-ion battery.

Claimed electric range in the Avenger is 400km on the stricter WLTP cycle,

while it has a 400V electrical system and supports DC charging at up to 100kW.

In markets like Italy and Spain, the Avenger is also offered with a turbocharged 1.2-litre threecylinder petrol engine with 74kW of power, mated with a six-speed manual transmission.

Peugeot recently revealed a new mild-hybrid 1.2-litre threepot to replace this engine in its

vehicles, and given Stellantis' propensity for platform and part sharing and Fiat's plans to offer combustion power until 2030, it could filter into other models.

The 101kW/230Nm Miller cycle turbo threepot is paired with a 21kW/55Nm electric motor, which can provide an extra 9kW of power to the engine under full acceleration.

The motor, inverter, and ECU are all housed in the electrified six-speed dual-clutch gearbox. The 48V lithium-ion battery is installed under the front left seat.

Peugeot says there is completely electric

driving capacity, albeit only to "start, manoeuvre and drive at low speed in heavy traffic", which Peugeot says still accounts for more than 50 per cent of urban driving. The car can also coast with the petrol engine off.

While the Fiat 500X is still offered in markets like Europe and the US, it was axed locally in 2021 as the brand "refocused towards consumer preferences".



Fiat now sells only the ageing 500 city car and large Ducato van, though it will finally gain a new model this year with the electric 500e.

The 500X is Fiat's only SUV in Europe, unless you count versions of the Panda and Tipo with plastic cladding affixed.

In Latin America, where Fiat enjoys a strong presence and a wider range – it's the number one brand in Brazil, for example - it also offers the Pulse and Fastback 'coupe SUV'.

2023 Fiat 500e electric car: \$52,500 Australian pricing confirmed

Two years on from its global debut, the new electric 500 is heading Down Under – and, as some might have expected, it won't be cheap

UPDATE: Fiat 500e pricing confirmed ahead of July launch.

The all-new Fiat 500e electric city car will be priced from \$52,500 before on-road costs, according to an industry pricing guide.

Only one flagship 'La Prima' variant in a three-door hatchback body style will be offered at launch, when it lands in July.

Full local specifications will be detailed from March, but expect the Italian-made compact EV to house the largest available 37.3kWh usable battery delivering around 315 kilometres of driving range.

It will also likely debut active safety assistance systems for the first time, boasting a 10.25-inch UConnect touchscreen with wireless Apple CarPlay and wireless Android Auto, and LED lights.

The spicier Abarth 500e electric hot hatch will arrive in late 2023.

If the pricing guide proves correct, the Fiat 500e will undercut its closest rival on price, the three-door Mini Electric Classic which costs from \$55,650 before on-roads, and sits just above the BYD Atto 3 Extended Range small SUV at \$51,011 before on-roads

Fiat To Launch Two All-New EVs In 2023

The new models will likely be a supermini and a small SUV.

While the Fiat lineup is fully electrified in Europe, it currently only includes a single pure EV offering – the 500e – as all the other models are hybrids. However, this anomaly is about to change as the Italian brand has confirmed the launch of two all-new EVs in the second half of 2023.

The announcement was included in Stellantis' presentation of the full-year financial results for 2022. While the presentation didn't provide any details about the bodystyle of the EVs, earlier comments made by Fiat CEO

Olivier François, as well as various reports from European media, offer more information about the upcoming launches.

Last year, the Fiat CEO confirmed four EV additions by 2027, including a supermini and three crossovers. The former will be a successor to the Fiat Punto and is one of the two launches that are expected in 2023. The yet-unnamed model will slot above the 500e in the Fiat range and share its underpinnings with the already available Peugeot 208 and Opel Corsa siblings, as well as with the next-gen Citroen

C3 and the upcoming Lancia Ypsilon. As with the aforementioned models, Fiat will reportedly offer both electric and mild-hybrid powertrain options for its new small hatchback.

The second EV launch that is expected for 2023 is the long-rumored Fiat 600. This high-riding model will compete in the hugely popular B-SUV segment, combining a compact footrpint with more practicality than conventional hatchbacks. The Fiat 600 is expected to be closely related to the Jeep Avenger and will be produced in the

same factory in Tychy, Poland, again offered in ICE-powered and EV forms. Note that this is a different model from the next-gen Fiat 500X which is rumored to grow in size.

Fiat will bring the fully electric 500e to North America in the first quarter of 2024, four years after its original debut in Europe. The urban EV is offered in hatchback, cabriolet, and 2+1 bodystyle flavors, while last year the Abarth 500e joined them as the performance-focused variant and the first fully electric hot hatch from the scorpion brand.
